



## ANZAC Centenary commemorative events

I was privileged to deliver the address at the Shrine of Remembrance on 4 August to recognise the declaration of war against Germany 100 years ago. This was a very moving ceremony at the Shrine, during which the Premier laid a wreath on behalf of the people of Victoria at the Eternal Flame.

On 5 August, I participated, together with the Senior Vice President, State Honorary Treasurer and the CEO, in the 'First Shot' commemorative event at Fort Nepean. This was a truly significant event to commemorate the firing of the first shot of the British Empire at the start of World War I. The event was brought together by Major Bernie Gaynor, in conjunction with John Prentice and the Sorrento/Portsea Sub-Branch, Parks Victoria and the State and Federal governments.

It was a fitting tribute to the events of that day 100 years ago and brought great credit on all those who were involved in its organisation and delivery. A special thanks to John Prentice for the way in which he represented the League on this occasion.

## Women's Council State Conference

At the Annual General Meeting of Women's Council, held on 6 August, I spoke about the function of the Council and its relationship with the Women's Auxiliaries around the State. I also stressed that the Women's Auxiliaries are auxiliaries of *their* Sub-Branches. To that end, the relationship between the Sub-Branch and the Auxiliary needs to be cohesive and cordial because, in many cases, the Auxiliaries are very strong supporters of the Sub-Branch.

I also believe that our Sub-Branches have a responsibility to engage in a collegiate way with the Auxiliary to mutually agree on the work that the Auxiliary will provide in support of the Sub-Branch. There is probably a good argument to have a member of the Auxiliary attend Sub-Branch Committee meetings as an observer, so that they are abreast of the activities of the Sub-Branch in a more informed way. They should, on occasions, contribute to Sub-Branch decisions and policies.

## Women on Sub-Branch committees

That brings to mind the wider question of the participation of women on our Sub-Branch committees. In Victoria, we now have eight female Presidents of Sub-Branches. However, there are very few Sub-Branches that have female members on their Committee. I believe it is time that we addressed this situation, bearing in mind the contribution that Affiliates can now make in the governance of our Sub-Branches. There are many female Affiliates who would make good Committee members. I ask all Sub-Branch Presidents to consider this in a very positive way.

## ANZAC Day follow on

You may recall the incident that occurred during the ANZAC Day March in Melbourne, when World War II veteran Jack Murphy collapsed and was rushed to hospital in a very serious condition. Jack was revived on three separate occasions from the time he fell to his arrival at hospital.

I visited Jack at his home the following month, together with the three St John Ambulance volunteers who attended to Jack on ANZAC Day. I was blown away by these young people – two of them are Doctors of Engineering and the third is studying her Masters in the same profession. They are truly remarkable young Australians of whom we can be very proud. It was a great outcome for Jack and he has promised that he won't march next year, but will ride instead!

## Australian national flag protocol

I have received comment in regard to the protocols related to the use and display of our national flag. I think it is important in the lead up to the Centenary of ANZAC that we are aware of these protocols and ensure that we adhere to them so that we do not cause any unnecessary offence. Please observe the following guidelines.

The Australian national flag:

- should not be flown with another flag on the same pole
- should not be flown together with the Australian Red Ensign

- should not be permitted to lie upon the ground; it should be correctly fastened so that it will not fall to the ground
- should not be used to hide spaces that may exist between the floor and the lower level of a desk, dais or platform
- should not be employed as a cover for a statue or a monument, or as a cover for a plaque at an unveiling ceremony
- should not be used as a cover for a table, a chair or other furniture
- should not be defaced by any object or badge attached to it or superimposed upon it
- should not be flown upside down (it is a myth that it should be flown upside down as a signal of distress).
