Melbourne's ANZAC Day commemoration activities are a way for veterans, their families, and the public to honour and recognise those who have served and currently serve for Australia.

Commemorative activities in Melbourne include:

- ANZAC Day Church Service
- The Dawn Service
- Commemoration March of Veterans
- Wreath Laying.

### Annual ANZAC Day Church Service

The 2026 ANZAC Church Service will be held from 10:00am on Sunday 19 April at St Paul's Cathedral, Flinders St. All are welcome.

### Dawn Service

The ANZAC Day Dawn Service will commence at 5:30am at the Shrine of Remembrance. It is recommended that you take public transport to the event as parking is restricted. There will be multiple screens around the Shrine to enable participants to view the proceedings.

### Food and Drinks

Food trucks will be positioned along St Kilda Road near the Shrine of Remembrance. Refreshments will be available for purchase from the food trucks at the conclusion of the Dawn Service. The food trucks will continue to operate until about 12:30pm.

Many hospitality businesses will be open in the city and Southbank, so you can grab a bite to eat between the Dawn Service and the March or after the March and before other activities. See the ANZAC Day website for more details.

### Commemoration March

Melbourne's Commemoration March is designed to enable those who have served Australia and its allies to re-form the ranks of their units and March. Descendants of veterans are encouraged and welcomed participants in the ANZAC Day March.

The March is also an opportunity for the general public to honour and recognise those who have served and who currently serve in defence of Australia or its interests.

The first veterans proceed down the March route at 8:30am and the March is normally complete by about midday.

### Wreath Laying

A wreath laying happens at the Shrine of Remembrance immediately after the March concludes.

## MELBOURNE ANZAC DAY COMMEMORATION MARCH GENERAL GUIDELINES FOR MARCHERS

### Banners in the March

As ANZAC Day is non-political, RSL Victoria kindly requests that all marchers, including Allied Groups, submit any banner designs under which members will march for approval prior to the event. All words on a banner must be in English. This measure is designed only to ensure consistency and appropriateness.

### Dress Guidelines

The ANZAC Day March is an act of Remembrance and Commemoration, and dress should reflect the dignity of the occasion. Jacket with collared shirt and tie for men and equivalent for women should be considered. Children accompanying adults should be of an age to be able to complete the March, and dressed appropriately.

Examples of clothing considered inappropriate for the occasion:

- Clothing displaying racist/derogatory/sexist or profane messaging, imagery or symbolism
- Clothing that is considered to be inappropriately revealing of private body parts or sexually provocative in nature
- High visibility workwear
- As part of marching attire, any National dress or costume or sporting paraphernalia should not be worn or displayed
- Clothing featuring football team branding.

### Medal Protocols

Please remember to adhere to the correct wearing of your medals.

Most Australian awards are pinned on the left, with the order of wearing honours and awards determined by the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia.

Medals worn in honour of a deceased family member should be worn on the right, to indicate that the awards are not their own.

The Returned from Active Service (RAS) badge is worn on the left jacket lapel, positioned near the buttonhole. The RAS badge stands alone and is not worn with any other embellishments, including full or miniature medals.

### Other considerations

- The Melbourne ANZAC Day Commemoration March is not a parade and therefore no vehicle, animal, weaponry or memorabilia (including historical uniforms) may be included without the prior approval of RSL Victoria as the March organisers. Escorts to Colours etc., and the catafalque parties may carry arms



- Please do not carry any photographs while marching. The correct way for a descendent to honour a veteran's service on ANZAC Day is by wearing their medals.
- Due to the number of participants and their safety, prams are not permitted in the March
- Please display the Australian National Flag with consideration and respect.

### Commemoration March Guidelines

The purpose of these guidelines is to remind RSL Sub-Branch members, Unit Association members, veterans and their families, as well as members of the general public, of the criteria for participating in the Melbourne ANZAC Day Commemoration March.

There are three ways by which an individual can participate in the March:

1. As a former, or current, member of the Australian Defence Force
2. As a Veteran of a Commonwealth or Allied Force
3. As a descendant of an Australian, Commonwealth or Allied Veteran who are wearing the campaign medals of their forebears on the right side of their chest.

### Veteran Participation

All veterans are encouraged to join in the Melbourne ANZAC Day March. We welcome participation from anyone who has served and look forward to your presence during this important event.

If you or your group wish to march, please read the following important information regarding veteran participation:

- Veterans who have been issued with medals are asked to wear them when marching
- Veterans using mobility aids are encouraged to participate, noting that the March route is approximately two kilometres. Please note that only one family member or friend may assist you during the March. The safety of all participants during this crowded event is paramount

- Veterans who are unable to physically march are able to request a vehicle and may have a single carer to assist them during the march; please contact RSL Victoria or the event website to register
- We encourage family members to march on behalf of a veteran; however, the veteran's medals are to be worn on the appropriate right side during the March.

### Australian Veterans

Veteran eligibility to march is based on the criteria to become a Service Member of the RSL i.e. any person who has served in the Australian Defence Force for a period of at least one day. Veterans should assemble with one of the service units or association of which they were/are a member.

The choice of where to march is a personal one; however, it is recommended that those who served together should march together, as an act of remembrance and mateship.

### Commonwealth and Allied Veterans

Veterans should be clearly identifiable by their campaign medals and should be at the head of each national group. No medals or awards earned from a nation that was in conflict with Australia or the Commonwealth should be worn in the Melbourne ANZAC Day March.

Dress should reflect the occasion, i.e. traditional/national costume or dress (including headdress) is not appropriate. Commonwealth and Allied contingents will form up in accordance with the Order of March and under the direction of the March Marshals.

Displays of foreign national flags are restricted to one per group.

Flags of a nation that were used when the nation was in conflict with the Commonwealth or Australia are not permitted to be displayed. The display of historical flags or ensigns of other countries that no longer exist is inappropriate.

Banners are restricted to one per group and are not to contain any political slogans.



### Descendants

Descendants of veterans are encouraged and welcomed participants, but they will not march in front of veterans.

#### Descendants of Australian Veterans

A descendant of a veteran may participate in the March as a carer (one per participating veteran), banner party or flag carrier, regardless of whether they are entitled to be a member of the RSL or not.

Descendants, other than the above, will be directed to March in a place of prominence in front of the Commonwealth and Allies contingent. **One descendant only of a veteran may honour their relative's service by wearing his/her medals on their right breast.**



#### Descendants of Commonwealth and Allied Veterans

Descendants of veterans are encouraged to participate to honour the fallen at the express invitation of the contingent leader/organiser. Descendants are to march behind the veterans within the national group.

The national group may have no more than 30 descendants of veterans participate, including banner party and flag bearers.

### General Public

Viewing the March is an opportunity for the general public to honour and recognise those who have served and who currently serve in defence of Australia or its interests. There are barriers along the route of the March and in the Shrine of Remembrance precinct. The barriers are there to keep a clear path for the marchers on ANZAC Day and to ensure the safety of the general public. The general public is welcome and invited to view the March from outside the barriers.

#### March Assembly

All March participants should be in their allocated Assembly Area at least 45 minutes prior to the expected time for their formation to step-off.

The listed form up times are the latest time we ask marchers to arrive at their allocated position in the CBD, so all marchers are encouraged to arrive well before this time, so they are ready to form up on time.

Assembly areas are indicated in the order of March and map below.

#### Dismissal of Marchers

As the head of each unit approaches the Eternal Flame, hats are to be removed (by following the unit leader's movements or by order) and the right hand over the heart and kept in that position until the unit is clear of the Eternal Flame, when the reverse is to be followed. Heads are to be turned right towards the Eternal Flame when passing it. Banners and flags are to be dipped.

Defence formations are to salute the Eternal Flame as they pass it. Marshals will be placed on the Shrine Forecourt to provide directions for the 'Eyes Right' at the Eternal Flame and the 'Left Wheel' to proceed to the dismissal area past the flags.

Formations/Units are to be dismissed after they have marched past the flag poles on the eastern side of the Shrine Forecourt. They are requested to move well clear of the dismissal area after they have completed the March.

### Vehicles Participating in March

The only vehicles that will be travelling along the March route are the RACV vehicles carrying veterans unable to march. The RACV vehicles will travel as a group along the March route to the Shrine of Remembrance.

### Security

A safe and enjoyable ANZAC Day is RSL Victoria's priority. Victoria Police are actively involved in the planning and management of the event and their attendance at the event has been confirmed.

### Safety & First Aid

St John Ambulance first aid points will be located in the Assembly Area, along St Kilda Road, the Shrine Forecourt and the Commemoration March dispersal point — with their main first aid facility located to the east of the Shrine Forecourt. They are supported by dedicated Ambulance Victoria units.

### Getting to Melbourne ANZAC Day via Public Transport

Extra early morning public transport services will run on ANZAC Day to support the Dawn Service at the Shrine of Remembrance.

Parking around the Shrine and nearby streets is restricted on ANZAC Day, so catching public transport is strongly recommended.

Large crowds are expected so please plan ahead at [transport.vic.gov.au](http://transport.vic.gov.au) and allow extra time.

### Travelling by train to and from the Dawn Service via ANZAC Station

With the opening of ANZAC Station, attending the Dawn Service at the Shrine of Remembrance is now easier than ever.

#### How to get there by train

1. Travel via the Metro Tunnel and disembark at ANZAC Station via Exit 1, to St Kilda Road North or Exit 2, St Kilda Road South.
2. Follow signage or staff directions to the Shrine of Remembrance.

#### Accessible area — shuttle service from ANZAC Station to the Shrine

From 4:30am on ANZAC Day, Travellers Aid will provide a free shuttle bus service if you need mobility assistance between Anzac Station and the Shrine grounds.

Please use ANZAC Station Exit 4 (Domain Road) — the shuttle bus pick up point is located immediately outside.

The shuttle bus will transport you and one companion to the designated Accessible Viewing Area near the Shrine. No bookings are required — simply arrive at the pick up zone.

Please note that capacity is limited, and priority will be given to attendees who require mobility assistance and one accompanying companion.

## Travelling by tram to and from the Dawn Service

Additional trams will operate on the Swanston Street and St Kilda Road corridors between Flinders Street Station and Stop 20 (Anzac Station) on Anzac Day morning.

Two extra services will operate on all CBD lines.

Tram services will stop running on St Kilda Road from 5:45am on Anzac Day until after the Commemoration March is complete and the road is clear of event infrastructure at about 2:00pm.

## Free shuttle bus services to and from the Dawn Service

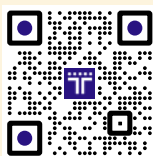
Transport Victoria will run free, wheelchair-accessible shuttle buses from selected RSL Sub-Branches and locations around Melbourne to and from the Dawn Service at the Shrine.

## Booking information

Bookings for shuttle buses are required by midday Thursday 24 April at [transport.vic.gov.au/anzac-day](https://transport.vic.gov.au/anzac-day) or 1800 800 007

The routes and pick up locations refer to **Table 1**.

After the Dawn Service, the free shuttle buses will depart from the Shrine at 7:00am from the drop-off location at Birdwood Avenue and return to all the original pickup locations.

- Some surrounding roads will be closed to vehicles.

## Road Closure Notification

Due to the nature of ANZAC Day in Melbourne, there are several road closures in and around the CBD, St Kilda Road and the Shrine of Remembrance precinct.

### Road closures from 12:01am–2:00pm on 25 April:

- Swanston Street between Flinders Street and Princes Bridge
- St Kilda Road (centre thoroughfare and service lanes) between Park Street and Princes Bridge
- Coventry Street at St Kilda Road
- Dorcas Street at St Kilda Road
- Grant Street at St Kilda Road and Wells Street
- Wadey Street at St Kilda Road
- Southbank Boulevard between Sturt Street and St Kilda Road
- Dallas Brooks Drive between Domain Road and Birdwood Avenue
- Birdwood Avenue between Domain Road and Anzac Avenue

- Linlithgow Avenue (east – west), between Alexandra Avenue and St Kilda Road (except for motorcycles).

### Road closures from 5:00am–2:00pm on 25 April

- Government House Drive & ANZAC Avenue between St Kilda Road and Linlithgow Avenue / Birdwood Avenue
- Collins Street at Elizabeth Street, just east of Swanston Street and Russell Street
- Russell Street will remain open
- Elizabeth Street at Flinders Lane and Collins Street
- Little Collins Street at Elizabeth Street and Russell Street
- Flinders Lane at just east of Swanston Street, and Russell Street
- Flinders Street at Elizabeth Street, Queen Street, just east of Swanston Street, and Russell Street
- Bourke Street just east of Swanston Street
- Swanston Street at Little Bourke Street, Little Collins Street, Collins Street, Flinders Lane and Flinders Street.

Please note that these areas that are closed to traffic are also tow-away zones.

## SUMMARY

The vast majority of Australians know the significance of ANZAC Day, but it is very important that we explain its significance to those whose forebears did not serve, or who are relatively new residents of Australia. ANZAC Day is a day of respect for our war dead and for people who served and died in service of this country. It is also about reflecting on those Australian values and attributes which we hold dear.

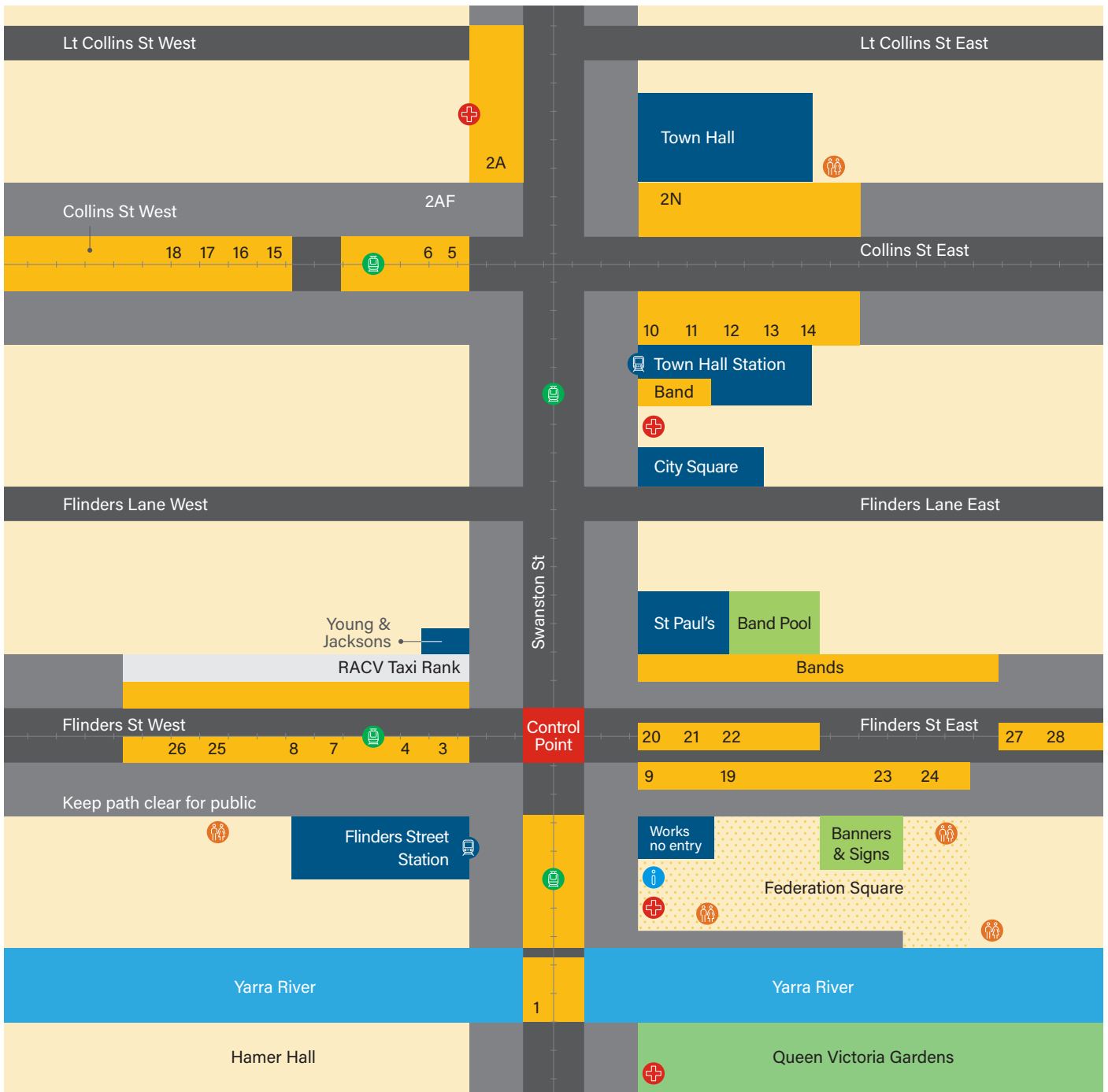
